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Principal's Points



Dear New Hope Families,

I would like to take this opportunity to raise awareness regarding one of the "hot topic" pieces of legislation (Senate Bill 8) that is currently being considered for approval in our state by forwarding you a news release

sent out by the district's Public Information Officer. Please note that this information neither supports nor discourages the existence of charter schools, but rather raises the concern about how current proposed legislation could potentially impact all public schools in North Carolina.

The political wrangling in Raleigh over the state budget is in full swing. The governor's budget, released recently, includes a 4% cut to education in addition to the 4.75% annual reversion. However, the General Assembly has openly called for Governor Perdue to decrease her budget by an additional 1.3 billion dollars. <u>Drafts of the General Assembly's budget</u> are beginning to surface, but they are far too nebulous at this point to provide us with any details.

The more concerning issue remains Senate Bill 8. Commonly referred to as the "No Cap on Charter Schools" bill, it would allow for the unrestricted expansion of charter schools and greatly increase the amount and scope of funding that school districts would have to provide to them. At the district level, the issue is not with the number of new charter schools but the fact that charter schools would have access to any and all funds that are controlled by the district, with the exception of federal grants.

While we already provide charter schools with the local per pupil allocation (from the county commissioners), Fines and Forfeiture funding and Fair Funding monies based upon the number of students from the district attending the school, Senate Bill 8 will expand the scope of the funds that they can draw from including capital funds, lottery proceeds, interest, grants and district fund balance. Furthermore, the district would have to turn over funding from More at Four Pre-Kindergarten Program, the Head Start program and the school lunch program, even if the charter schools do not offer these programs.

The devastating impact of this is compounded by the fact that we have been building up the district's fund balance to mitigate the severity of the impending reductions from the state. Our initial calculations are showing that we would lose a minimum \$150,000 from fund balance alone. What is unknown at this time is the impact that Senate Bill 8 will have on school organizations such as booster clubs and parent-teacher associations.

I have also embedded the link from the Charlotte Observer stating that North Carolina has fallen to 46th in the nation for school funding and 45th in the nation for teacher salaries. http://www.charlotteobserver.com/2011/03/10/2125791/nc-falls-to-46th-in-perpupil.html We have also added some new information to the district's budget website, including letter templates. Our best chance to repeal this legislation is through grassroots efforts. I would encourage each of you to contact the members of the General Assembly (a contact list is on the budget page) and express your concerns about the impact that this legislation and potential budget cuts will have on education in North Carolina.

First Grade News







During the month of February 1st graders were hard at work in the NH Bear Bag Tag Factory. They learned about marketing, production and assembly, division of labor, quality control and sales. Students assembled the tags and added details to each bear before they were laminated. The factory workers examined each tag for quality assurance. Once tags were given the stamp of approval, they were laminated and ribbons were added. After about 3 weeks of production we were able to open the Bear Bag Tag Store. Students and adults came to purchase the tags for 25© each. 1st graders worked at the store

collecting money, making change and giving out receipts. The tags were a huge success and we quickly sold out. Also, as part of this Social Studies Economics Unit we took a trip to Build-A-Bear Workshop where each child was able to make and keep their own bear. This month we are learning about rocks and soil. Students will participate in hands on activities as they rotate through all of the first grade classrooms. We look forward to building rock collections and playing in the dirt!

On February 11th the 2nd grade teachers and students ventured to Raleigh to the Museum of Natural Science. This field trip is always a great one. The hands on Animal Life Cycles classes are an instant hit

with the kids. Where else do you get to touch a snake and a dove, watch a huge bullfrog splash around and aww at new baby mice?! When we weren't being taught about life cycles we explored the 4 floors of the museums. We saw it all, from hissing cockroaches to dinosaurs, pumas to sea horses. Needless to say the bus drive back to school was abuzz with excited chatter. Thanks to all of the parents who were brave chaperones on this

fun and exhausting trip.

The 2nd grade students continue to improve every day. We're all excited to see the growth they're making in every subject. We have some real scientists, readers, writers, and mathematicians on our hands. Everyone is working hard and pushing on to day 180. It's been a great journey so far!



Grade Level News continued



The third grade has been working on becoming analytical scientists and expressive poets. Isn't that a great combination! Mr. Swain reports that Swain's All-Stars have been testing a mystery soil to determine what is in the soil. They have also been writing cinquains, haikus, concrete poetry, and acrostic poems. Wirth's Stars have been rolling up their sleeves and digging in too! They have participated in lots of experiments to learn about different soil types and the properties of soil. They have also been reading and writing poetry this month and are about to begin a study of tall tales. Ms. Norris's Navigators and Ms. Dean's Explorers enjoyed their analysis of soil samples using magnifying glasses, test tubes and wet and dry samples. They also have read and written different types of poetry and are really excited about learning to use a Thesaurus to expand their speaking and writing vocabulary. Ms. Rettig's Rockstars created and have been taking care of, a healthy compost bin (in the classroom). Mr. Swain and Ms. Rettig's kids aerated all the NH garden boxes and Ms. Wieland and Ms. Rettig's kids did NH soil sample analysis on the trail. Ms. Wieland's Winners and Ms. Rettig's Rockstars each had a Poetry Café where students shared their poetry with parents, teachers and administrators and celebrated writing together. Ms. Rettig began a computer club for students who wished to stay after school on Fridays to work on approved web sites for exploration and practice.

Next up, our third grade will be learning about communities past and present and comparing the lives of families then and now. For our study, the third grade explores the settlement of the American west. We will learn how the early settlers decided to look for new land in the frontier and how that affected the Native American population. During this study, we will also read and write tall tales and create hall murals of our favorite characters (with assistance from wonderful Mrs. Jones!). Our field trip for this unit of study will be a visit to a real buffalo ranch right here in Hillsborough.

The 4th graders have been very busy. They just finished up their Artist in Residency program with artist Virginia Queen. Mrs. Queen came into the classrooms and worked with the students on poetry, expression and movement. The students attended a poetry/storytelling program at the Carrboro ArtsCenter last Friday where they were able to listen to Glenis Redmond and Charlotte Blake Alston. It was a wonderful program and the students had a great time. The students are also busy learning about the Iditarod race in Alaska. They are each following a musher and learning all about the race. Stephanie Rogers came to the classes to share her experiences in Alaska with the race and she shared some great videos.


<u>Counselors Spring Forward with Transitional Activities, Parent and Student Educational Programs as well as Character Development Throughout the Third Quarter</u>


